If you know someone who fits the bill, please call me at 831-252-5933. If I do not answer the first time, please try again.



Introducing: Jennifer Stalley



The girls are 4 years old and met at daycare when they were 2 years old.





I had heard many things about the park's condition, and I thought I was prepared, but I have to confess that when we got to what's left of the park headquarters, I cried. I wished we hadn't gone.

I wanted to go home.

But we were there, and our dog wanted to explore, so we hiked the N. Escape Road (paved road and the only place dogs are allowed) as far as we could go – about 1.5 miles out.



As I contemplated the enormous loss the park suffered, I also started seeing and appreciating the resiliency of the redwoods.

They were burnt, cracked, old and devoid of their large branches, but oh, so much new growth!!

Healthy, green, thick new growth...



Will Big Basin ever be the same? Probably not (definitely not in my lifetime!) but it WILL be there for future generations to enjoy.

Big Basin Update – from Debbie Boscoe:

We've gotten some great news about our immediate and long-term trailer parking in Big Basin.

Long term plan: As many of you know, Big Basin never had any specific horse trailer parking – it was catch-as-catch can to find a space to park on any given day. With the Reimagining planning that has been going on for the last couple of years, dedicated equestrian parking is being proposed in the facilities plan. That plan won't be finalized for a while (so much to consider!) but the locations being evaluated include the area around the previous Gatehouse and the Saddle Mountain Welcome Area, both of which would connect to trails and have space for multiple rigs. Remember that this is a long-term plan and it will be several years before it comes to fruition. BUT IN THE MEANTIME:

Short term plan: Parks staff are pursuing temporary shared parking for at least a couple of rigs at a time. These also will have easy access to open trails, and a good turn-around. The spots will have to be reserved, using the reservation system that all park users go through, but spaces can be reserved weeks in advance. The temporary access to these spots will be on weekdays, subject to availability.

This isn't much change from pre-fire when going to BB was only for weekdays due to the park's popularity and the lack of designated horse trailer parking. The good news is that with this new approach to specific horse trailer parking, we will have designated spots that we can validate with a reservation. While many of us (including the park guys) would like more and sooner, there are many players in this decision who will need to weigh in and that could take a few months.

As we get closer, we will give you instructions on making reservations and maps of the open fire roads (there are lots!). We will all need to be flexible as there is and will continue to be lots of heavy equipment working in the park for the foreseeable future, but we will be able to park and ride there again very soon – hopefully this summer.

One tough note: the park planners have stressed the need for accurate information on what they are doing, and what is being planned. Unfortunately, there is a petition circulating that is not accurate in regards Big Basin, and is pretty frustrating for those of us working hard to figure out both short and long term parking for equestrians. We don't need unnecessary drama— the park planners are doing their best to get us, and a host of other users, what we want.

More on the temporary parking soon!

Before filming began on "Under Western Stars", several of the stables that provided horses to Republic Studios brought their best lead horses to the studio so Roy could select a mount.



I made the journey south to ride one of QSER Board Member Magda's mustangs, Milo, along with QSER member Janna Land on Pistola, another of Magda's mustangs. We were signed up for the 60, and knew it was going to be a windy, and maybe rainy, day but we were going to give it a go no matter what!

The horses ate and drank well the night before, so we set out with the other riders into the gale!

Wow, it was windy, especially at the tops of the ridges, but we just kept going, and soon enough we were at the first vet check. We were happy to see our crew, Sheryl and Chris, waiting for us, and we all rested for 30 minutes.

The second loop was very difficult - it was long and we seemed to always be heading into the wind no matter which direction we were heading. The horses were definitely questioning our choices! We had made good time on the first loop, so we were able to walk up the big hills and only had to trot where the footing was ideal. We were so happy to get to the second vet check, and relaxed in the portapotty as it was the one place we could get a moment of quiet from all that wind, LOL!

We decided to take it easy for the last 10 miles, and mostly walked, which got us to the finish a bit after dark. It was a great day out, even if uncomfortable! We so appreciate all the work put in by the Ride Managers Brian and Val, plus all the other volunteers and vets. I am also grateful to Magda for entrusting me with Milo. And wow, Janna picked quite a doozy for her first endurance-length ride, but she showed the resolve and grit of a tried and true endurance rider the entire time! It was a special weekend to be a part of.







And then there is Ms. Jane Dotchin...

An 82-year-old woman has completed an annual seven-week trek from England to the Scottish Highlands with her pack pony and pet dog. Jane has been making the epic 600-mile journey every year since 1972, catching up with friends she has made along the way.

Heading north, the horse lover travels between 15 and 20 miles a day until she reaches Inverness in the Scottish Highlands. This year, she set off again with her steed Diamond from the off-grid smallholding where she lives near Hexham, Northumberland.

'I love camping and I love the countryside,' she said. The more I've done it, the more nice people I've got to know en route who I want to go back and see again.'

Jane carries everything she needs including her tent, food, a few belongings, and her Jack Russel Dinky

tucked into the saddlebag. 'She loves sitting in the saddlebag,' Jane said. 'She's quite happy sitting in there, watching the world go by.'

And despite wearing an eyepatch, Jane is determined to continue the annual tradition for as long as she can. 'I know the route so well, I don't need to read maps. I can manage if I keep to the routes I know,' she added. The journey takes around seven weeks, depending on the weather.



'I refuse to go slogging on through pouring wet rain,' Jane added.

Jane previously received the British Horse Society lifetime achievement award, which she said was 'a bit of a surprise'. 'There is always something interesting happening and there is never a dull moment,' she added. The British Horse Society Scotland wrote in a Facebook post: 'Well done Jane, Dinky the dog and Diamond - 2023 was a wet one but even well into your 80s you never let the rain deter you. You are an inspiration to riders everywhere.'

Something that we should think about.... (sad, but true):

Pets, it turns out, also have last wishes before they die, but only known by veterinarians who put old and sick animals to sleep. Twitter user Jesse Dietrich asked a vet what was the most difficult part of his job.

The specialist answered without hesitation that it was the hardest for him to see how old or sick animals look for their owners with the eyes of their owners before going to sleep.

The fact is that 90% of owners don't want to be in a room with a dying animal. People leave so that they don't see their pet leave. But they don't realize that it's in these last moments of life that their pet needs them most.

Veterinarians ask the owners to be close to the animals until the very end.

"It's a fact that they will probably die before you. Don't forget that you were the center of their life. They are a part your family. No matter how hard it is, don't leave them." Don't let them die in a room with a stranger in a place they don't like.

It is very painful for veterinarians to see how pets cannot find their owner during the last minutes of their life. They don't understand why the owner left them. They needed their owner's consolation. Veterinarians do everything possible to ensure that animals are not so scared, but they are completely strangers to them.

Don't be absent because it's too painful for you. Think about your pet. Endure this pain for their sake. Be with them until the end.

A couple of recent fun rides...

Good weather, good friends and good horses are a... well... good combination! If you are looking for places to ride, here are a few suggestions of places that seem to stay open even after a few rains:

Fort Ord: great footing (especially after a good rain!) and lots of trails to explore, get lost (and found), lots of parking and some pretty cool views. Carry a map... there are lots of little tails shooting in every possible direction! The flowers are starting to pop up and at the moment, there is lots of water for the horses to drink and wildlife for the humans to enjoy. There are three entrances/access points: The Equestrian Center off of Imjin Rd, the Creekside entrance off of Reservation Rd. and the Toro Creek/Guidotti entrance off of Hwy 68. **Shannon Thomas** and I recently had a very fun ride there. Highly recommended!





Butano State Park: About 40 minutes North of Santa Cruz, this park is a jewel that must be seen! Just don't bring a large rig... the parking, as far as we could see, is not very horse trailer friendly. **Alicia Stanton** and I drove there in her small 2 horse rig and managed to fit in one of the parking spaces... this was in the middle of the week and there were no other cars. I'm not sure if there is a larger lot somewhere. The entrance kiosk was closed and we could not find anyone to ask.

The trails, on the other hand, were absolutely gorgeous and I think we saw two or three people there on our 15 or so mile ride. The diversity of the trails and views is fantastic!

Our only disappointment was that about half way through a lovely loop, we encountered a couple of large trees that blocked our forward progress. We turned around and explored a few other trails. All of it was really, really lovely! I want to go back there and explore some more soon, and hopefully be able to ride the whole loop!

Almaden Quicksilver Park: This is a more familiar park for most of us, but it's worth mentioning that it seems to stay open after it rains more than some of the other nearby parks (Calero and Rancho San Vicente). Lots of great trails, but we always find the signage a little confusing. There are 3 different entrances, all with good parking for rigs. The Mockingbird parking lot is paved, big and I've never seen it full. The Hacienda lot is also really big, not paved and closer to Calero, but I am not sure if there is a way to connect the two parks. The Hicks parking lot also gives you access to the trail that goes all the way up to The Cube, which is a pretty gnarly climb, but the views from up there are absolutely the best! This trail also gives you access to Sierra Azul and Mount Umnhum.

The views from this park are hard to beat, and the trails are great for conditioning your horse. Many hills to climb, lots of good roads to



canter and quite a variety of single tracks that will keep you and your horse entertained. There are a couple of nice places with picnic tables and water troughs if you want to take a break and enjoy the views. Echo and I sure did!
