May is CUREPSP awareness month. PSP is Progressive Supranuclear Palsy, a neurodegenerative disease in the class of diseases that are called Parkinson’s Plus syndromes. We meet monthly with other patients and caregivers to discuss methods of coping with and alleviating the symptoms of the disease. All proceeds after paying my expenses will go to CUREPSPS and to the UCSF MERI Center, which also host supportive groups that we attend. Based on what we have seen so far nothing will be stopping them!






## Could Wild Horses Help Fight Wildfires?

*The controversial animals graze on the grass and brush that fuel blazes. So one California naturalist asks: Why not send them to fire-prone wilderness?*

In 2014, William E. Simpson moved to a remote hillside near Yreka, California, close to the California-Oregon border. He was trying to get away from his previous buzzing internet business, seeking isolation in nature. It didn't take him long to notice that he wasn't alone: He was sharing the hills surrounding his humble cabin at the edge of the Cascade-Siskiyou National Monument with bobcats, coyotes, elk, mountain lions, wolves, bears and more than 120 wild horses. At first, the horses kept their distance, just like all the other wild animals.



But eventually, a skinny, pregnant white mare with a foal in tow approached him. Simpson had once studied veterinary medicine, and his training kicked in. "I thought she was probably suffering from parasite overload and fed her some oats with an anti-parasite I had on hand," he recalls. A few days later, the mare brought her entire family. Over the years, the horses have come to him with injuries, such as cuts from the barbed wire abandoned farms had left behind or gashes from mountain lion attacks.

When the 38,000-acre Klamathon fire tore through the hillsides in 2018, he had an "aha" moment. He and his wife Laura defied evacuation orders and helped the firefighters navigate the remote dirt roads. They stayed to defend their small ranch, but also to watch the horses. "I wanted to see how the horses reacted to the fire," Simpson says. "Would they panic? Run the opposite direction and get entangled? Nobody had ever really done a study about that."

The horses remained calm and kept grazing. "They are used to fires," Simpson realized. "They have been here for two million years." He now attributes the fact that his cabin and the surrounding hills were largely spared by the fire to the horses. "Each wild horse consumes about 30 pounds of grass and brush a day," Simpson has observed. "They reduce the wildfire fuel, keeping the wildfire risks at bay."

In 2022, Simpson founded a nonprofit and named it after his mission: Wild Horse Fire Brigade.

Simpson is proposing a large-scale solution to several issues that have long been the subject of furious debate across the American West: He wants to free the roughly 60,000 horses that are currently kept in Bureau of Land Management (BLM) corrals and relocate them strategically to the nation's more than 110 million acres of designated wilderness and other open land, where they could keep grasses and vegetation in check as keystone herbivores.

When asked about the suggestion to rewild the horses “for natural wildfire abatement,” the BLM states that it “does not have the legal authority to place wild horses in Wilderness Areas.” The BLM suggests that “using wild horses to reduce fuels could also cause ecological problems,” including reducing native plant and animal diversity through intense grazing.



Simpson dismisses the BLM statements as “propaganda” and has hired a lawyer who argues that counties and fire departments do have the authority to request any number of wild horses for fire protection.

Simpson undertook a five year study to show that wild horses are significantly more beneficial for the flora than livestock because unlike cows or sheep, “wild horses will move through an area much faster than invasive species livestock do.

This behavior allows the grasses and plants to recover quickly from the light grazing-browsing.”

A recently-begun five-year project with California State University, Sacramento, which has already sent its first two students to Cascade-Siskiyou for field study, aims to put Simpson’s findings on a more solid scientific basis.

He is convinced that the horses can heal more than the land.

When a veteran with severe PTSD visited him on the ranch, a stallion Simpson had named Black Fury approached the man on its own. “My friend had been blown up in a police station in Mosul and was hospitalized for years because of his extensive injuries,” Simpson recounts. His visitor was hesitant, but Simpson encouraged him to gently pat the horse. “There was a minute where that stallion was just staring at him.” Simpson says the encounter changed his friend’s life: “Rolland felt that someone put a warm blanket over him. From that day forward, he started healing. He said, ‘Black brought me home.’”



## ***Riding up to Mount Umunhum and “The Cube”***

If you live anywhere in the Bay Area, at one point or another you may have seen “The Cube”, which sits on top of Mount Umunhum. The name Mount Umunhum comes from the Ohlone Indian phrase for “The resting place of the hummingbird”. Along with native history, Mount Umunhum is also well known for its military history.




The Cube was built atop Mount Um in the late 1950s. It's an eight and a half story (84.5 feet tall) concrete radar tower that was part of the Almaden Air Force Station, a radar surveillance post which operated from 1958 to 1980.

Not many people know that, in addition to being able to drive there, you can also ride your horse there!

Alicia Stanton, Carolyn Tucker and I decided it was time to conquer this mountain, so we met at the Hicks Road entrance to Almaden Quicksilver Park and started to climb... and climb and climb some more!!

We were rewarded with some amazing views, a lovely, very well marked trail, and an up close and personal visit to “The Cube”.



Unfortunately, the interior of the tower is not open to the public, so you can only see the outside, which is interesting enough. There are also lots of lovely places to sit, have a picnic and admire the almost 360 degree views of the area.

It's definitely worth the visit, by car, hike, bike or horse... but by far, the best is by horse, of course!!

***From Julie Suhr, related to Mt. Umunhum:***

At the second Castle Rock Challenge Ride I designed a trail that left Morgan Hill and then climbed to the ridge top and went across to Umunhum, dropped to Lexington Reservoir and then followed a trail beneath Highway 17 into down town Los Gatos.

Marinera placed well and won BC. She was animated but I could look in her eyes, see distress and knew I had over ridden her. In those days the vets were as new to endurance as we were and the only criteria was pulse and trot out. I went home ashamed to have taken so much from a gallant horse. Now the vetting is much more strict and thorough. We have learned to listen more to what the horse is telling us. The eyes will tell you just as much as peoples' will when you make eye contact with them.

The trail from Hicks Rd. used to be only one horse wide, but it has been thirty or forty years since I have been on it. (It is now a beautifully graded trail! – Elisabet)

The view at the top of the mountain on a clear day is just as you described it.

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## Congratulations to Becky Hart and Rio: 2023 Pard'ners Award



*I heard that Becky and Rio used to train on the Mount Umunhum trails, so I checked in with Judith and here is her response... WOW! – Elisabet*

"Becky and Maryben used to condition there three days a week, religiously going after work two days a week doing a ten mile ride straight up and down and then on a 15-20 mile ride on the weekend. Rio could gallop the five miles straight up. No other horse could keep up with him."

## Origin of the word VETERINARY

The word "veterinarian" originates from Latin. In ancient Rome, horses used in the army (loading beasts) that were very old would gather in a place where they could enjoy and rest. These animals were called "veterinus".

The people who cared for these animals were called VETERINARII (veterinarius), which was a derivative of the word VETUS / VETERIS, "old", because of this, the profession of animal care was called that.

259 years after the creation of the first school of veterinary medicine the first two veterinary schools, Lyon, on August 4, 1761, and the École Nationale Vétérinaire d'Alfort (Paris), were created by French Claude Bourgelat, lawyer and lover of horses, who did not accept inefficiency in the empirical treatment of his breed horses, and used his influence to convince King Louis XV to create the School of Veterinary of Lyon, which began operating in 1762, with its students recruited among horsemen, specialists in the care of the helmets (?) of the horses, horsemanship being one of the subjects studied.

The second country was Austria in 1768, followed by Italy in 1769, Denmark in 1773, Sweden in 1775, Germany in 1778, Hungary in 1781, England in 1791 and Spain in 1792. At the end of the 18th century, there were 19 schools of veterinary medicine across Europe.

The first recognized veterinarians graduated from major veterinary schools founded between 1762 and 1821, such as the Royal Veterinary College in 1791 in London, and Lyon School became a symbol of modernity.

## **MORE information on the BIG BASIN STATE PARK meeting held on 2/12/24**

**From Sarah Gray:**

Dear Quicksilver Endurance Riders,

I trust this message finds you well. I am reaching out to share critical information regarding the planning meeting for the Big Basin State Park rebuild planning meeting that I attended last night (at Felton Community Hall). Unfortunately, the news is disheartening as there are currently no plans to maintain the limited equestrian infrastructure that existed before the CZU complex fire.

While there are ambitious plans to enhance general park access, the absence of provisions for equestrian facilities poses a threat to our riding community. Despite expressing concerns about the elimination of our 3-4 horse trailer spaces, there has been minimal feedback, with arguments citing the space constraints imposed by horse trailers. Ironically, the park is proposing the accommodation of larger vehicles such as metro buses and independent shuttles, indicating a double standard in allocation.

To address this issue, I propose forming a united front with influential voices from Quicksilver, SCCHA, Equine Evac, and prominent local barns. Our collective advocacy is crucial for preserving equestrian access, especially in light of diminishing trails each year. It is imperative that we act swiftly and decisively to safeguard our riding spaces.

Our primary objectives are as follows:

1. Retain no less infrastructure or trails than existed before the fire.
2. Install a new water trough or, at the very least, a spigot for equestrian use.
3. Secure three or four trailer parking spots near the trailhead (Gazos Creek/Middle Ridge Road), with proximity being a top priority.
4. Explore the possibility of horse corrals for camping and additional tie bars.

To address these concerns, we must seek answers from the planning officials:

1. What considerations are being made for equestrian needs in the park's redevelopment?
2. Can our community contribute ideas, assist in planning, or provide financial support?
3. Can we obtain assurances that the parking and access we had before the fire will not be compromised?

I invite your thoughts and suggestions on this matter, as well as your willingness to join forces in making a stand for our equestrian rights. The future of horse access in Big Basin State Park relies on our collective efforts, and together, we can ensure the preservation of our cherished trails.

Thank you for your time and commitment to our shared cause.

Please forward this far and wide, let's get our voices heard.

**From Jennifer Stalley:**

Thank you Sarah! I will echo your words. This situation is quickly become dire. The rangers were reluctant to engage. Of the 60 attendees, we were ALL equestrians and were ready to help and discuss. However, our excitement and engagement was met with a tepid response at best.

At every racetrack you visit, you'll find outriders. These expert riders are tasked with supervising the day's races and making sure that jockeys and horses all stay safe. They help to guide horses to the starting gate and back to the stable after the race is run. On the rare occasion that a horse becomes loose, it is the outrider's job to catch it and get it under control. Many of their steeds are retired thoroughbreds themselves. The partnership between outrider and horse is crucial, as the outrider must trust in their mount while they attempt to grab a loose horse." (The comment below is from the original post on National Museum of Racing and Hall of Fame):

"OUTRIDERS are on the track during morning workouts as well. They keep order in the chaos, pick up loose horses and help stop runaway horse with riders. They also help with crazy horses. Outriders have saved me on several occasions and play a crucial role in horse racing. ❤️ to the outriders!"

17,5 Lovatt & Rickett Rubicon MW Cross Over Saddle. Great to use for Dressage or Endurance. I gave up riding 1 year ago. I have ridden only one 25mile L D in this saddle, it was a perfect fit and very comfortable.

Soft wool flocked, horses love it and it is a super soft seat for the rider. This saddle was made directly in England for my horse and me (but with a regular M/W tree) it has special D-rings. It fits a variety of withers but not so well for very high withered horses. Horses move out beautifully underneath. It is soft on the withers!!!

My horse was never sore anywhere from long distance rides.
